


# Some terminology?

- **Bill:** A very structured paper that outlines the solution to the topic along with related information
- Working Paper: A bill that is in the drafting process
- Working Group: A group of people working together to draft a working paper

Unmoderated Caucuses...

# **Unmoderated Caucuses?**

- What is it: A time for delegates to write author and draft bills
  - When motioning for an unmoderated caucus, you don't need to specify the topic (It's implied you will work on working working papers)
  - There are no parli pro rules during an unmod
    - People can get up from their seats
    - Everyone can talk (there are no turns to speak)
  - Because there are no parli pro rules, there are no speaking times

#### • Why:

- Drafting bills during structured debate is difficult
- Lots of people talk when drafting bills
- The solution = Unmods

# **Unmoderated Caucuses?**

- When: After a significant amount of debate
  - People should have ideas for bills already in their head
  - $\circ$   $\$  If you try to motion to soon, a chair will rule it dilatory

### • Technically When:

• You can motion for an unmoderated caucus whenever you can motion for a moderated caucus

"Motion for a <insert time> unmoderated caucus"


# **Speakers List: Magical Motions**

  - "Motion to Open Speakers List with <speaking time> speaking time"
- To get Added to Speakers List
  - "Motion to be added to the Speakers List"

## **Moderated Caucuses**

#### • What is it:

- Fixed amount of time to discuss a specific topic
- The number of speakers is FIXED unlike a Speakers List

#### • Why:

• Allows delegates to focus debate onto a specific topic

#### • Special Characteristics:


- You don't yield if you have extra time
- You usually just speak from where you are sitting--don't go to the front of the room
- Fixed speaking time, fixed topic, and fixed total duration
- To speak in a moderated caucus, just raise your placard and wait to be called on.
  You don't have to motion to speak
- There is no list of speakers. After each time someone speaks, the chair will nick

# The Magical Moderated Caucus Motion

- When: After the Speakers list
- "Motion for a <length of moderated caucus> moderated caucus with <speaking time> speaking time on the topic of <topic>"

## **Moderated Caucuses**

- Other important notes:
  - During a moderated caucus, don't speak about something not related to the topic
  - The speaking time, total time/number of speakers left, and topic in a moderated caucus is usually written down on a large piece of paper or put on a projector
- After a moderated caucus has elapsed you can:
  - "Motion to extend the moderated caucus for <insert time>"
  - Motion for another moderated caucus:
    - MULTIPLE motions for different moderated caucuses can be submitted
    - If there are multiple moderated caucus motions submitted, the committee will vote on each individual moderated caucus motion in order of most destructive (longest) to least destructive (shortest)
    - The first moderated caucus motion to receive a majority will be "passed" and
